Dear Friends of Trinity,

I posted a quote on Facebook the other day that sort of went “viral” in some circles. It attracted a little bit of internet traffic to our church’s Facebook page. It’s a very powerful quote about what the Christian Church is all about. I’ll quote it here in case you missed it:

"As someone who loves the church, I am saddened by the perception of Christianity as a vehicle of moral control and good behavior, rather than a haven for the discouraged and dying. It is high time for the church to remind our broken and burned out world that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is a one-way declaration that because Jesus was strong for you, you're free to be weak; because Jesus won for you, you're free to lose; because Jesus succeeded for you, you're free to fail."-- Tullian Tchividjian (Grandson of Billy Graham)

I couldn't have said it any better.

This is a clarion call for the church to be the church, placing people’s trust and hope in Jesus Christ and not in themselves. The church begins to go off of the rails when it loses this focus.

The worship of the Christian Church is not a self-improvement or motivational seminar. It’s a living encounter with the Living Triune God in Word and Sacrament. Jesus took your failures, your weaknesses, and your losses onto Himself. He became your sin as he hung on the cross. It defeated him. It shamed him. It embarrassed him.

It killed him.

God raised him from the dead. The victory is His and freely granted to us as His Word is proclaimed, as baptismal waters flow, as sacramental bread and wine is distributed from one sinful person (me) to another (you) in loving forgiveness. Nothing else in the world can give this to you.

Thank you to everyone who came out for the hayride on October 6th. We had a great day, and a lot of fun, at Konow’s Corn Maze.






SUNDAY SCHOOL/YOUTH NEWS:

Financial Secretary’s and Treasurer’s 3rd Quarter Report:

Financial Secretary’s and Treasurer’s 3rd Quarter Report: The congregation adopted a 2013 General Fund Budget of \$196,472 at its Annual Meeting on January 27. The Budget is 4.6% higher than contributions made to the General Fund in 2012. The Council deemed the increase warranted to cover expected higher operating costs. A modest salary increase of 2% was granted to Pastor, the Secretary, Organist and Choir Director. Primary support of the General Fund by the congregation is very important to meeting Trinity’s ongoing needs.

During the quarter, all due bills were paid. Budgeted contributions were made to Missions and LCCF. Additionally, \$1,492.25 was given to Feed My Starving Children, on behalf of Trinity members, as part of direct out-reach efforts. General Fund receipts were about 1.3% higher

than those received during the first nine months of last year. General Fund expenses were about 3% lower than the budget for the same period. The balance on the original \$100,000 mortgage, used to finance the new restrooms, was \$16,079.23 at September 30. What's that sound?

We learned in October that our church organ was in a state of disrepair. Our thanks to Lori Hilger for her willingness to move to the piano for church services and to Dan Bay for configuring his keyboards for use in our traditional services. Many of you will remember Bob Mitchell, former organist at Trinity, and even he got into the act here to help us address this problem.

Bob was instrumental in the decision to purchase our current organ in 1973 (yes, 40 years ago as of this past June!). While he left the area in 1984, he has since moved back and currently resides in Arlington Heights. I spoke to Bob on several occasions about the organ and he provided me with some valuable insights, some of which I wanted to share with all of you. We paid about \$15,000 for this organ just over 40 years ago. While parts can still be found for it, repairs are not inexpensive. We incurred a charge of close to \$1,500 to replace the "DAC" board, which is one of the electrical panels that amplifies the sounds of the organ.

Unfortunately, in the process of replacing this board it was also discovered that the power supply needed to be replaced at an additional cost of just over \$800. That 'crackling' noise you may have heard on occasion was the organ sputtering due to an insufficient power supply. We have gone ahead and ordered that part as well, and we are hopeful that it will be replaced this Friday, one day ahead of Pastor Bacon's son's wedding. It will be nice to hear the full sounds of our organ once again this coming weekend. Looking forward, though, we need to think about what to do when the next repair is needed. Please read on for more details on this.

Our current organ is a digital organ (not a pipe organ) and it has served us well for more than 40 years. Predicting the next repair is impossible to do, as there is no way to know when an electrical panel will stop working. At some point, the cost of repair will need to be considered against the cost to replace. Among replacement options, a keyboard will likely be among the options given the technological advances and comparative cost of a keyboard versus an organ.

Rest assured, no decision has been made about the organ as yet. With the recent repair – funded in large part by a donation from Women's League of approximately \$1,500 (please THANK a member of Women's League for their forethought and generosity here) – we appear to be in good shape with the organ. Looking forward, though, we have just exhausted our organ repair fund plus about \$800 more and we'll need to consider what to do when the next repair is needed. We plan to present options on this at the 2014 Annual Congregational Meeting in January. Please plan to attend!
