Dear Friends of Trinity,

As Easter approaches quickly we are given opportunity to ponder the fact that life is borne out of death. It's apparent in nature and in our own bodies. In that light, consider these words of Jesus:

The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. (John 12:23-24)

Jesus is talking about himself and all who follow him. As a grain of wheat produces only after it dies, so it is with Jesus. Notice that Jesus gave this process a very special word, and that word is *glorified*. It's not a word we would expect, and if it were up to us, we would give it a different label. Death is obvious. We know it when we see it. We mourn when we experience it because it seems to be so final and so overwhelmingly sad. But in the big picture, which is harder to see, natural processes are occurring that support the perpetuation of life.

Because it's so hard to see and ponder this, it's difficult to follow Jesus precisely because Jesus demands that his followers give up everything. To die, if you will. To set aside all of our grandiosity and bloated egos. To put off those things that puff us up. You will not get much support for this from our consumer society, which tells us to accumulate and to better ourselves by material and financial gain, thereby making ourselves big in the eyes of others and to be larger than life. That is being glorified in the eyes of others, and it's not to our advantage in the long run.

Only in Christ are we truly put to death and raised up. In his own death and resurrection he has shown us how we are really and truly glorified. It is only in being united with him through the waters of Holy Baptism that we die and rise, setting for us the true pattern of our lives and showing us how life actually works. Life is borne out of death! We as Christians are life givers when we repent daily of our complicity in the world's version of glorification and put on the glorification that is only in Christ. That is the glory and the joy of Easter.

At Eastertime we rightly celebrate God raising Jesus from the dead. But we can also rightly celebrate *our* rising from the dead in anticipation of the time when death will be no longer and eternity gives us life everlasting! I wish all of you a very Happy and Blessed Easter!

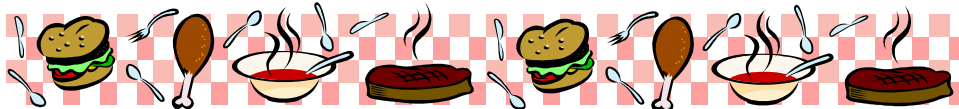

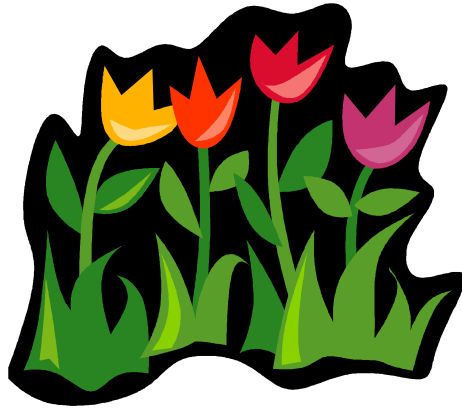
CONTRIBUTION STATEMENTS

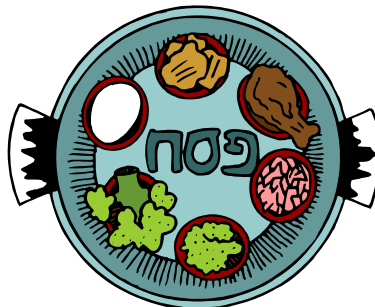

March event - The San Antonio-bound youth will be hosting a Make Your Own Pizza lunch on Palm Sunday, **3/24**, following the 10:30 a.m. church service. Families are invited to stay after the children have sung in church. Cost is \$3 per person for one personal-size pizza; \$5 per person for two personal-size pizzas. Drinks and desserts are included. We'll supply the ingredients to make your own pizza, then we'll have some games while the pizzas cook. We'll also have some raffles. Hope you can attend!

2013 Financial Report: The congregation adopted a 2013 General Fund Budget of \$196,472 at its Annual Meeting on January 27. The Budget is 4.6% higher than contributions made to the General Fund in 2012. The Council deemed the increase warranted to cover expected higher operating costs, including a 9.9% increase in health care premiums. A modest salary increase of 2% was granted for Pastor, the Church Secretary, Organist and Choir Director. Primary support of the General Fund by the congregation is very important to meeting Trinity's ongoing needs.

Our congregation was truly blessed with financial support during 2012. Even though General Fund receipts were lower than in 2011, special donations and lower expenses allowed for the payment of all bills. Some Steward Account reserves and Memorial Funds were used for the tuck pointing and stained glass projects. We exceeded our budgeted remittances for Synod Missions, LCCF and Debt repayment while generously providing special support for Mission India, Feed My Starving Children and Morning Star charities. The balance on the original \$100,000 mortgage, used to finance the new restrooms, was \$21,693.92 at year-end. We want to thank everyone for their support of Trinity Lutheran Church and its missions. If you could not make the Annual Meeting and have financial questions, please contact Janice Prospero, Financial Secretary, or Bruce Hasch, Treasurer.

Speaking of things financial, Council made the decision to support 3 charities this year. Each will be supported at separate times. We will be supporting SowHope, Feed My Starving Children, and MorningStar this year. All three have a food/hunger aspect. What follows is a little bit more about each charity and the time frame for each one.



SOWHOPE

SowHope is run by Ginny DeCarlo's niece and we will be supporting them through the end of April. SowHope sponsors wellness, education, and economic projects that give impoverished women opportunities to improve their lives. They are primarily focused on women in the developing world who make less than \$2 a day.

Because we are also charged to be good stewards with the gifts YOU donate, here is some more information, courtesy of GuideStar.org – an organization that checks on charities to see what they do with the donations that are entrusted to them: More than 93% of donations go to program services (about 3% to fundraising and 3% to admin costs). As a rule, 80% is usually pretty good.

Here is a little more that Jeff McDonald graciously researched for us:

Projects:

1. Wellness: A) Physical B) Emotional
2. Educational: A) Literacy B) Vocational and Technical C) Higher Education Scholarship
3. Economic: A) Micro-loans B) Small Business Training

Program Long-Term Success:

2007- Two projects. 1000 women received micro loans in Bangladesh and 1 PhD student in India received tuition reimbursement and a computer.

2008 - AIDS prevention for 1000 women in Egypt. AIDS care for 40 in Kenya.

Microloans for 1400 women in Bangladesh and 30 in Nigeria. Literacy for 4200 women in India. Computers for 20 in Zambia.

Total number of women impacted by SowHope wellness, education and economic projects:
7650

We are going to try to fund a specific project for them. Our goal is to raise \$2400.00 for a Birthing Center in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC)

In the Democratic Republic of the Congo, an association of women has built a birthing center to assist women in childbearing. They are seeking funds to better equip this center, specifically for the purchase of a delivery table and solar lighting.

About 75 babies a month are delivered at the center.

Total project cost \$2,400 Imagine! Think about how a very small amount (to us) can have such a huge impact on so many lives.



Once again, we will be joining forces with Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Frankfort to support Feed My Starving Children. This year it should be even bigger, as we join the community-wide event at Lincoln-Way West on **August 9-10**. Do you remember how many we fed last year? A) 53,000 B) 79,000 C) 96,000 D) 116,000? Answer later in the newsletter. How many will we feed this year? This will be the focus of our fundraising efforts from **May 1- August 10**.

MorningStar Mission will be the focus for the remainder of the year and consideration is also being given to focusing some of our efforts on the Lutheran Malaria Initiative through LCMS.

Sunday School is also focusing on the hungry and needy at this time: They are in the process of holding a food drive until **March 23** to fill the New Lenox Food Pantry. If you are able to bring food, please bring canned or boxed goods to church with you and we will bring them over to the New Lenox pantry. We have been told that they are having a hard time keeping their shelves stocked at this time of the year.
